Conley Sr. to rezone 504 - 15th Street NW from B-2 to B, PB-3 for an office building with storage and parking of tow trucks and other motor vehicles. The Planning Commission recommends approval. Is there anyone in the audience wishing to speak for or against this zone change, please come forward... Is there anyone in the audience wishing to speak for or against this zone change, please come forward... Is there anyone in the audience wishing to speak for or against this zone change, please come forward... Apparently not, the Chair declares this public hearing over in regards to this matter. The matter now rests in the hands of Council. The Ordinance will follow later this evening.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: You want to dispose of that matter at this time?

MEMBER MALLONN: Yes.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Yes. The Chair is going to exercise its prerogative now and divert from the original agenda and go to Ordinances for their third reading and vote on Ordinance #16.

MEMBER CASAR: Mr. President, I move that we adopt Ordinance #16; seconded.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Moved and seconded that you adopt Ordinance #16; are there any remarks under this Ordinance?

MEMBER WEST: Mr. President. Yes, I went through the neighborhood on the Conley zone change and, actually, all the residents there wanted to see the trucks off the streets, so, they were in support of it, except for one family. They wanted to see Conley's actually take ownership of the old Mini Mart that's across the street and move their trucks over there. This evening, I had a chance to talk to the owner of Conley's and he had indicated he did make some attempts to purchase that property over there, but, of course, was not able to. But, I do support this change.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Any other remarks?

MEMBER CARBENIA: Mr. President, would it be proper to ask a question of one of the Conleys?

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Ah, you'd have to move to have them speak here. They did not talk under the public hearing portion so, if you wanted to hear from them, you'll have to move to give them time to speak and specify that length

of time.

MEMBER CARBENIA: Oh, that's all right, I just had a question.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Are there any other remarks?

MEMBER BERNABEI: Mr. President. Member West, if you could answer this. Would this zone change enable Mr. Conley to remove the vehicles, the towing vehicles, from the street and park them off-street?

MEMBER WEST: The lot doesn't allow for all his trucks to be moved off the street. Actually, the lot is pretty small and I'm not clear on whether the building is coming down or not, but, Mr. President, is that a question that I can ask Mr. Conley at this time?

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: No, the same applies to you. Of course if you leave your seat, with my permission, and you can go down and ask them the question, but I can't deviate from your Council Rules. Your Rules specify if you want to ask somebody something or have them speak, you have to move to do so.

MEMBER WEST: Yes, I'd like to move to have Mr. Conley speak for 2 minutes on the matter; seconded.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Moved and seconded to allow Mr. Conley to speak for 2 minutes. Are there any remarks? If not, by voice vote, all those in favor signify by saying aye; those opposed no.

NO REMARKS

MR. CONLEY ALLOWED TO SPEAK BY UNANIMOUS VOTE

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Mr. Conley, you have 2 minutes to speak. What, who wants to ask the question now? Member Bernabei?

MEMBER BERNABEI: Yes, Mr. President. Mr. Conley, would this zone change permit you to take your vehicles, which are sometimes parked on the street, either on 15th Street or Woodland Avenue, and get them off the street and on, onto a parking area?

MR. CONLEY: Yes, sir.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Member Carbenia, you wanted to ask a question?

MEMBER CARBENIA: Ah, yes sir, that could be done. Yes, I'd like to know, are you going to tear that building down on there so you have more room to park some on there? It doesn't seem like you can park too many on there.

MR. CONLEY: There's no plans for that at the moment sir.

MEMBER CARBENIA: Also, then, would you like, consider putting up a fence, ya know, along the 15<sup>th</sup> Street side?

MR. CONLEY: If I did that I couldn't get my trucks out. The way it is now, I can back my trucks in, I can pull them

out, in and out, and go.

MEMBER CARBENIA: Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Member West, did you have a question?

MEMBER WEST: Yes, Mr. Conley, is there any plans for the future of maybe getting some more space for your larger trucks?

MR. CONLEY: No, sir. I would like to buy the property across the street. I approached the people to buy it. They refused. I offered them \$50,000 for it but they opted to sell it to someone else for 42 so I don't know what to tell ya. It's the story of my life.

MEMBER WEST: Member Carbenia, that property's in your ward. I wonder if there's any assistance that you may be able to help Mr. Conley out?

MEMBER CARBENIA: I'd love to see somebody purchase that place. Mr. President, I'm sorry.

MR. CONLEY: There's somebody in there right now. There's a carpet cleaning place in there right now and they're using it, which is, ya know, they're in and out on the weekends. If you did some homework, you can find out who it is.

MEMBER WEST: Thank you, Mr. Conley.

MR. CONLEY: Thank you.

MEMBER HAWK: Mr. President, I have a kind of collateral question. Are we referring to the property on the, on the, it would be the northeast corner of 15th Street and Woodland that was formerly Woodland Drugs? Yeah, the Mini Mart. That's the north...

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: That's the northeast corner.

MEMBER HAWK: North, northeast, let me think about this. Wasn't that building in a sad state of disrepair not too long ago?

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Ah, gentlemen, you're out of order, we're discussing a zone change and you're discussing another building so....

MEMBER HAWK: I'm sorry, we'll discuss it. I'll ask under miscellaneous business. Thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: I can, I can cherish your regard for that, but that's out of order.

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Mr. President, if I can, I'll share some information that came to Council through

the Planning Commission, a few salient facts on the communication addressed to Council. At their meeting on Tuesday, May 11th, they recommended approval of the change from B-2 Neighborhood Business to a PB-3 Planned General Business for this particular address. The salient facts they cited for approval were that some of the surrounding area was zoned B-2 and B-3 to the west, or 1-A to the north, east and south. The surrounding areas consist of mixed uses. Among those they mention various commercial uses along 15<sup>th</sup> Street and Cleveland Avenue. The planned district zone change requires the building to stay as is, in its current configuration; and, lastly, the change is requested to permit the use as an office, with a storage area and parking. Thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Is there any other discussion on this matter?... If not, the question before you now is granting the zone change, Ordinance #16. If there are no other further remarks, roll call vote

the VA building, I guess, when they did the plans for that, or whatever the case may be, they, part of the agreement, from what I understand, was that they vacate that alley for parking for the VA building.

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: Mr. President. I do have the advertisement when they announced the public hearing on the street vacation. The public hearing was held November 17, 2003 just for Council's information.

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Mr. President, thank you. I was introduced to Mr. Toolan and spoke with him briefly before the meeting, as did Kathy Tatarsky who is our lawyer who usually handles zoning and related matters and he also spoke for a bit with Mr. Bruce Williams, who is more familiar with the case. We did understand Mr. Toolan's frustrations about not having been directly notified. He also understood, though, that the immediately adjacent land owners to the alley were the only ones that had to be notified by law and consented to it. One of the things he suggested was that in the future, we as a City, consider notifying a larger circle of owners who may be adversely affected when something like this occurs to avoid that sort of pain and frustration. Miss Tatarsky will take a look at it but we also did tell Mr. Toolan that it's very unusual and very unlikely that we would ever re-dedicate a vacated street because it becomes the property of the people who are adjacent to the vacation and I think Mr. Toolan understands, understood that.

MR. TOOLAN: Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Grace Shahan.

MS. SHAHAN: Good evening, my name is Grace Shahan. My address is 718 - 29<sup>th</sup> Street NE, Canton, Ohio, and I have lived there for the last 24 years and have dealt with my property flooding and sewer back ups numerous times during these years, having lost 3 furnaces, 3 washers, 2 driers, a refrigerator, plus hundreds of dollars in personal items. The basement walls are deteriorating but I'm hoping that this will soon be in the past as Plain Township has been working with Canton city utilities to plan for larger sewers to aid drainage. But, I understand that the City utilities is not willing to help Plain Township with the finances, even though we pay City sewers and I would like to know why. Why are you not willing to help us solve this problem? My neighbor, behind me on 28<sup>th</sup> Street, which is in the City, had basement walls caved in last summer. Will my wall be next? And so, my, my question is directed to the Director of the Canton City Utilities, which I understand is here tonight.

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: Mr. President. I met with Mark Cozy, Plain Township Administrator last week. There was no indication given at that meeting that we would be unwilling to help in this project. In fact, we were able to come to an agreement on the exact size of the pipe that would be put in on the project on 29<sup>th</sup> Street and how the connection would be made. We're right now waiting for those final plans, but we never gave them any indication that we would not be willing to help with this project.

MS. SHAHAN: You say you are willing to help with financing it?

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: It's up to be determined how much we would be financing because most of that is not located within the City but where they make the connection with Market Avenue, we told them we would be open to discussing the financing. I am not prepared at this meeting to tell, to say how much we'd be willing to do. It depends on what the plans look like.

MS. SHAHAN: I mean, I thought that because that we paid City sewer that City utilities would, ya know, help us financing that part.

SERVICEDIRECTORELLSWORTH: Right. We have a separate storm sewer and sanitary sewer system and where they're making the connections, is actually, to our storm sewer system. They are not connecting to our sanitary sewer system. There is an existing City sanitary sewer line running up 29<sup>th</sup> Street but what they're talking about is a storm sewer connection that will connect to the large detention basin that is located at Weis Park on 25<sup>th</sup> Street and in order to do that, they will need to connect to our lines indefinitely. So, we did meet with them last week. We're aware of the problem and it is going to be fixed some time this year, is my understanding. Plain Township will be funding the brunt of that but where they make the connection, we're still in discussions as to what the City's portion of that will be.

MS. SHAHAN: Now, is, because we have sewer back up, doesn't that come from the City sanitary sewers?

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: What is happening is that there is rain water infiltrating into the sanitary sewer system, either through illegal connections, manholes, or some, or some breaks in the line. By relieving the storm system in that area so that you don't get the pooling in that basin area in which you live, you will relieve that kind of infiltration into the line. It will also close an existing line that will then solve that problem for you, hopefully.

MS. SHAHAN: Thank you for answering my questions.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speak is Frank Stranan.

MR. STRANAN: My name is Frank Stranan. I live at 800 - 29<sup>th</sup> Street NE, Canton, Ohio. We've lived there 27 years and what Gracie was saying, we've had the same problem, not just, you know, like every couple years, but every year, every summer, every year we get a hard rain, the street floods and probably 5 times our basements backed up. I got a letter 27 years ago from Stanely Cmich, who some of you remember was the Mayor at that time and, you know, he knew we had a problem. So, I'm just commenting on what she had. We got the same problem, sewers backing up, street floods all the time and I'm getting too old to clean basements, you know, clean yards up and,I'm just commenting on that. And, we've talked to Mark Coozy, Cozy, whatever his name is, and supposedly, you're going to do something to help us out. Thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Lou Bianchi.

MS. BIANCHI: I'm Lou Bianchi. I'm representing my sister on 708 - 29<sup>th</sup> Street NE and she depends on me to take care of the house. And, I have the same problem as Grace, flooding, streets flooding, she's lost a furnace, washer, dryer and now this time, it was a water tank. And, evidently, they've got stakes on the streets letting us think that they're going to do something about the property there. So, it's these houses that's all flooded that we just don't know what to do there any more because we're losing so much merchandise in the house, in the basement and the house is small so they keep most of their stuff down the basement. Like, the washer and dryer, furnace and gas tank and it's been replaced, all of it, in the last 4 years because of the flooding. And, what does a person do? You just can't keep buying new all the time, and, we're just hoping that someone will come through and help us out with the street flooding or the sewers. That's all I have to say because Grace has told you most of it. I thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Service Director, the Township and the City are working on this problem together?

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: Yeah. I first became aware of this problem last week and I had a meeting, I think it was Thursday, with Mark Cozy. This area where they live, is in fact in Plain Township. It's right on the border where the City is where, it's kindda strange, where it goes from Canton to Plain Township there. We met there, we met last week and, you know, there was a lot of discussion with our engineers about the size of the pipe. We came to an agreement on the size of the pipe and, basically, all that's left now is to decide how much the City will contribute because they are coming across our right-of-way on Market Avenue. In fact, we'll have to close a lane of Market Avenue at one point when they make that connection. But, my understanding is that Plain Township is raring to go for this project. They want to get it going and we're fully in support of it.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: It sounds to me like the surface water is infiltrating the sanitary lines then. Is that the case?

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: That's what it sounds like. If you're getting pooling in those manhole covers there, you'll get some that way, also, we know in many areas of the City and the township, there are illegal connections. In fact, in the next several weeks, we'll be coming down with a new down spout program that should hopefully take care of some of those problems.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Okay.

MEMBER CARBENIA: Mr. President, I got a question for the Director. On that, on that situation on 29<sup>th</sup> Street, 28<sup>th</sup> is in the City but most of those storm sewers run down the back yard between 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>, is that our responsibility or not?

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: No, that's actually, there is a private system that's not on our books that we are aware of that exists that runs from 29<sup>th</sup> Street across to 28<sup>th</sup> Street. Plain Township has agreed to plug that line because it actually impedes storm water movement the way it's set up and the size of the line. So, they're going to plug that line, they're not going to close it all together, they're going to plug it so if they need to get back in there, it'll actually improve the drainage for those residents by plugging that line because it actually connects to a manhole in the middle of 29<sup>th</sup> Street.

MEMBER CARBENIA: Mr. President, can I continue? Otherwise, you're saying you're going to plug that off, is that the one that runs down the back yard on 28<sup>th</sup> Street or is it the ones on 29<sup>th</sup>?

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: If we're talking about the same line, the only line I'm aware of, I'm not aware of any private system that runs parallel through 28<sup>th</sup> Street, but there's one that runs perpendicular. There's a manhole on 29<sup>th</sup> Street and it runs across, through yards, over to our system on 28<sup>th</sup> Street and what it has done is actually impeded the flow on the 28<sup>th</sup> Street line and also caused backup problems. So, Plain Township has agreed to plug that line in consideration for us, allowing them to extend down to Market Avenue and eventually get into our basin at Weis Park.

MEMBER CARBENIA: Okay, well, I just wanted to know that because...

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Member Carbenia, I'm going to stop this now because it isn't public speaks which would allow you to ask a couple questions. Ask these under Miscellaneous Business.

MEMBER CARBENIA: Oh, okay, well, this was about the situation.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Mary Baumler.

MS. BAUMLER: My name is Mary Baumler. I'm a resident at 514 - 22<sup>nd</sup> Street NW in the City of Canton. I appreciate the opportunity and the privilege of speaking to you tonight, Mayor Creighton and City Council, regarding the issue of flooding that I have in my home. I'm a life-long resident of this City and as an adult, I made a decision to purchase my home in Canton 18 years ago. I currently have 4 children in the Canton City School District. For the first 12 years that I lived in my home, I had one episode of flooding. It occurred in June, 1989. Since 1998, I've had water in my basement every time it rains hard anywhere from 6 to 12 inches. Last year, I had to have the entire line, drainage line, from my home to the street, opened by a commercial company because of debris that had been dragged in from the storm sewers. Prior to that, I had 3 days of a foot of water standing in my basement. When I called the City, I was told nothing could be done with standing water. So, we personally paid to have that opened so the water could drain out. When I purchased my home in 1986, it included a fully furnished or finished, carpeted and paneled recreation room. Now, the carpet has long since been ruined and removed, the underlying tile has been eroded to cement and the paneling has rotted 6 to 12 inches from the floor. New paneling that was installed 8 years ago is warped and rotting. My basement holds 2 bedrooms, a laundry room and a full bath. I use my basement as an extension of my family's living space. It has to be this way. I have 4 children and 2 step-children that visit every summer. Six years ago, I filed a claim with the City for material loss and homeowner's insurance for the floor and wall covering loss. Consequently, my homeowner's insurance rate tripled and I have been unable to find a more reasonably priced plan because of the claim. It would be impossible for me to lift all of the loss that I have incurred in the last 6 years, material and personal memorabilia. Suffice it to say, it has been extensive and each episode represents a major loss of time due to clean up, hauling of debris and laundry, which also comes with a cost, namely my Canton City utilities. The very system which creates my loss, further compounds it by an increase in usage charges. The last episode occurred last Monday night. I spent Tuesday and Wednesday, I think, in those 2 days I washed approximately 20 loads of laundry; my washer died. In order to sell my property, I would have to disclose this flooding issue. But, I don't want to move. I want my City to acknowledge this problem and determine how best to solve it. In 1998, I was told the flooding was caused by a 20 year rain event. I think we had 3 of them that summer, and there's been some every summer since. The problem has deteriorated with every passing year. My neighborhood had a meeting with our Councilman, Mr. Hart, last year, and the only advice we received was that our gutter and down spout systems would be smoke-tested to see if they were emptying into the storm sewers, which to me feels like an attempt to put the onus back on the home owners.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Ma'am, you're 3 minutes are up. I'm going to ask that you bring your remarks to a close.

MS. BAUMLER: Please, Mayor Creighton and Council, keep faith with your loyal citizens and develop short-term and long-term strategies before we decide to leave with very heavy hearts. I was very encouraged to hear the citizens of Plain Township are getting some action. I'm very hopeful I'm going to hear the same. Thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Steve Franks.

MR. FRANKS: Hello, my name is Steve Franks. I'm at 715 - 28<sup>th</sup> Street. I guess the property lines runs between my house and Grace's house here and of course what happens is when 29<sup>th</sup> floods, all the water runs into my back yard which just makes my down spouts useless. There's nowhere for the water to go so it ends up in my basement too. And, unfortunately, when the basement does start to leak, everything goes down to the center of the drain but it doesn't go, it just fills back up. So, we're in the same boat that everybody else is. We actually need a boat in our basement. So, it's the same problem. Everything deteriorated. We have to repaint, we've got mold growing, you know, it's a health hazard too. So, I know, it's just something that needs to be done. Eventually here, we've got to get something done and that's in Canton City I believe, because the line is on, is our property line is Plain and Canton. That's it.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Nancy Sponseller.

MS. SPONSELLER: Hi, my name is Nancy Sponseller, 714 - 28<sup>th</sup> Street NE. I'm flooding too because 29<sup>th</sup> Street is flooding and last year when we had the big flood, the whole street was bringing us landscape timbers, railroad ties, trash cans, everything. The man across the street, his foundation wall caved in with a bang and everyone has lost things in their basement, which it's what you've already heard. But, we get it on 28<sup>th</sup> Street and we live in the City. I have pictures, if you would like them.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Can you leave them in the Council Office?

MS. SPONSELLER: I sure can.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Okay, bring them up here please.

MS. SPONSELLER: Thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Do you wish these returned, ma'am? (NEGATIVE RESPONSE) All right.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Gloria Wright.

MS. WRIGHT: My name is Gloria Wright. W-R-I-G-H-T and I love on 809 - 29<sup>th</sup> Street NE, out on the corner of 29<sup>th</sup> and Beverly so, I'm also experiencing the water and it's, it's a health hazard and it is hard; and it's hard on me. My husband's had a stroke in '99 and so, you know, he's not able to help me and so he's going down-hill so I'm dealing with that now and with the flooding. So, hopefully we can get some help. Thank you so much.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker's Hanh Keene.

MS. KEENE: In name is Hanh Keene and I live in 807 - 29<sup>th</sup> Street NE and I have the same problem what they were saying, is my basement floods. Three years ago I had to (*inaudible*) and every time we left to go on vacation or something, we not enjoy it because we really worry about you know, the water flood. So, I hope the City and Plain Township get together and do something. I live in there for 14 year and I got floods twice. But, last weekend, we stayed up until 4:30 in the morning. We had 2 pumps going on. We pump the water out a window. Thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Bill Jasso. Well, Bill, under the new Council rules, I have to have your

home address, not just Time Warner.

MR. JASO: I'll be glad to. My name is Bill Jasso. My home address is 2182 Forest Oak Drive, Akron.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Okay. Go ahead.

MR. JASO: Mayor, Members of Council, as you know, from time to time, Time Warner Cable prepares a report to Members of Council and the Administration on significant changes in our service. I'm here this evening to advise you that we have begun installing customers in the City of Canton to Time Warner Cable's new digital phone service which is something new for our, for our company. Digital phone, just very briefly, uses existing telephones and in-home wiring that already exists. For the benefit of the Safety Department, digital phone is e-911 and both CALIA compliant, so we comply with all of the State and Federal Regulations involving residential telephone service. Standard features of digital telephone service will include call waiting, caller ID, call waiting ID, 4-1-1 services, 6-1-1 repair service and operator's assisted calls along with directory listing and memory portability. Simply said, that means that you can keep your existing telephone number. As you may remember, from our notification to Council earlier this year, Time Warner Cable received authorization from the PUCO last December to provide this service. I want to emphasize this that this is not internet telephone service, but we do use voice over internet protocal technology on our own broad ban network. This is another major investment that we have made in the City of Canton totaling some \$15,000,000.00 as we continue to provide advance tele-communication services for our customers in Canton. I thank you very very much for your time this evening.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Our final speaker is Fred Johnson.

MR. JOHNSON: Mr. President, and the Mayor. My name is Fred Johnson. I live at 2438 East Tuscarawas Street in the City of Canton. Last year, well, my basement has been flooded several times. Each time demanding that you throw away all the furniture and all the extra material that one might have in his recreation room. Last August, I think this engineer's name is DiMarco, he came out to our place and he talked to Wallace Haley who's here with me who lives at 201 Freedom Avenue NE and went around our area and he told us that the sewer line down on Wallace is the place where most of the sewer goes and with the addition of cleaning out the, the place, the debris and of course with the work that's being put over there, the lines over there on 5<sup>th</sup> Street NE, would aid us that we would not have this to re-occur so soon. However, last Tuesday night, we all know what has happened and as one lady so plainly spoken that my, in my rec room where the, the wood is frayed and I'm afraid that we will be having mold there. I am asthmatic and of course, this is one of the things I fear, and right now beside the sewer back up, since last August, I had another flooding this week. When I called to ask for assistance to come in, get this out, well, of course, I was told that the materials are being used, and I can imagine it would be because so many people had similar incidents. So on Saturday, I waited all of Saturday afternoon, the person didn't come. So, he said I'll come Tuesday, but if it's an emergency I will come Monday. He called me Monday at 11:30 and said I'll be there at 1:30, 12:30---11:52 he called back and he said I can't come today so I'll come tomorrow. So, in the mean time, I have 2 dehumidifiers, windows open, 2 fans trying to dry this out but the stench is there and I'm, the way I feel, by the time he gets there tomorrow, much of the water will have been absorbed by virtue of the fans. I'm at a point whereby I just don't know what else to do. I personally went out today and I checked all my spouting, and I'm getting drainage from every side of the house so it's not that my spoutings are filled, and I don't know what else to do. I don't know what else to do.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Who is this person that you contacted to come out?

MR. JOHNSON: I thinks it was DiMario That was last June.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: And he hasn't come out yet?

MR. JOHNSON: He came out last August. And of course, he promised us, I mean he was very heart, heart-felt very good to think that these things would not re-occur so soon. And, of course, he had a map. He showed us all the areas whereby this would probably go, whereby we wouldn't have this same situation again. But, it's, it's there. I mean, all the people in my area, Freedom and of course, I live on East Tusc on the south side, the sewer line is just not taking it and of course, I can look with great disappointing feeling that when we have a big rain, I'm going to have the same situation again.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Okay, sir, your three minutes are up.

MAYOR CREIGHTON: Mr. President, if I may. Mr. Johnson, I understand that you talked to Jimmy DiMarzio last August. Do you know who you spoke to in this last episode?

MR. JOHNSON: In the last which one?

MAYOR CREIGHTON: In this last rain, in the last week. Did you now make a call again?

MR. JOHNSON: No. In fact, the reason I didn't make a call is because I, I was, I was on vacation and I couldn't make... my neighbor, here, Wallace Haley, took care of these matters and so when I got back home Friday night, then on Saturday, I start tryin' to get someone to get water out and then the same person who's the steam master, he said he would come out. But of course, that was three different promises and it had not been met yet. And of course, the stench is overwhelming.

MAYOR CREIGHTON: Thank you.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Thank you, sir.

MR. JOHNSON: Thank you.

## **MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS**

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: We are now under Miscellaneous Business. Is there any Miscellaneous Business? Member Carbenia, do you want to continue your questioning about the flooding?

MEMBER CARBENIA: No, that's all right. I'll just talk to some of the people. Thank you.

MAYOR CREIGHTON: Mr. President, if I may, I'd like to take this opportunity, although you'll get to see him many

times, is to introduce the new Manager of the Civic Center. His name is A. J. Boleski and if he would stand, I want Council to know him and I invite all of Council to please go up and visit A. J. up at the Civic Center. Ask any questions, give any suggestions and I just wanted to make sure that everyone did meet A J.

MEMBER ZACHARY: Mr. President, I'm just kind of curious to know, because it seems like the problem with drainage and flooding is not just targeted to one area of the city. So, I know the Mayor had put together a Task Force to address the recent flooding problems, but I was kinda of curious to know what short-term plans we have to help people, as well as long-range goals we have, as far as correcting the problem in the future.

SERVICE DIRECTOR ELLSWORTH: Mr. President, as you know, the problems we have in the City with drainage are tremendous. They can be overwhelming and their causes are varied and sundry. You know, at this point, we are attacking the problems as we can, both in manpower and through funding, the funding that we have available to us. For the people who live in the Ridgewood, Market Avenue area, we do have a new sanitary sewer project. Regarding the gentleman on East Tusc and those on Freedom, I need to investigate that and I will investigate that tomorrow morning to see what we have planned in that area. I did note, in looking at the work orders for sewer, or for basement cleanups, that that area was, wasn't hit as hard as some other areas were. So, the short-range goal is, is to try to fix what we can now. The long-range goal is to figure out how to fund the other hundred million dollars worth of projects that we have related to drainage in this City. Several weeks ago, we had a meeting where we presented some ideas for storm water utility. This may be the time to pursue that more vigorously by appointing a committee from Council to look into the feasibility of such a utility. As you know, the Capital Improvement Fund is primarily responsible for most storm water projects and that fund is severely over-burdened. It is funded by income tax dollars, almost exclusively, and as you know, the income tax numbers have been depressed. So, we need to find a way to build up the infrastructure of this City and, there are many areas that have aging infrastructure and many areas that never had any infrastructure. And so, every day is, I have a drainage issue. Last week, I had a whole lot, but, we're attacking them as we get them and we're looking to have a plan in place. The problem is the funding.

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Mr. President, if I can add to that. While the City is looking more closely at what they can do in the short and the long term, so is the County. Many of you know Bob Fonte, the Director of the Stark County Park System. He is a self-described, frustrated hydraulics engineer who is used to going out in the public, sector by sector, identifying issues that need developed. A lot of the parks line the flood plain so he's managed to bring together elected representatives from every political subdivision in Stark County. Everyone understands that water does not respect boundaries and sometimes there's a concern that if one political subdivision, one city, one township, one village, fixes something, it might adversely hurt their next door neighbors because of not planning ahead with proper ditches or proper pipes and retention basins and detention basins and they're looking at everything and anything--keeping more vegetation where it's supposed to be, keeping future housing allotments from having too much hard surface and not enough ponds. We all know about that, here, unfortunately. So, there are four sub-committees. They have begun to meet in various townships. They are working on problem identification, legalities, education, business, agricultural, farmers are represented, industries are represented and again to sum up, they're trying to make sure that while all these terrible things that are happening to different sub-divisions are being studied by a city, by a village, by township, they don't hurt the next person over, and that's also going on at the same time. And, Bob has been quoted as saying it took 25 years or more to develop some of these problems, it's going to take a while to solve them, unfortunately.

MEMBER WEST: Mr. President, several, a couple months ago, I asked Safety Director in reference to using drug

money that's seized from, by the police officers, if we could use that for surveillance cameras and for signs and I wanted to check tonight as to where the status of that is.

SAFETY DIRECTOR HUNT: Mr. President, I have checked with the Auditor's office and with the Police Department and talked to Chief McKimm. It is my belief that we will be able to fund some purchase of cameras out of that forfeiture money.

MEMBER WEST: Secondly, how would we access that from, in terms of the wards. Would we write a letter to the Safety Director, a police officer?

SAFETY DIRECTOR HUNT: Our intent is to firstly, purchase these cameras and then come back to Council and try to determine where there are needs. Councilmember Carbenia spoke to me several months ago about the possible use, Councilmember Zachary also has been in contact with the Chief of Police for possible purchase of cameras, mobile cameras, to add to different parts of the City for not only crime, but also we're having a lot of trash being thrown in the streets by unwanted individuals. So, it's our hope, within the next couple months, we can review the funding mechanism and maybe purchase some of these cameras.

MEMBER WEST: I thank you for that, but I also want to say that in our area, Ward 2, there's a lot of pan-handlers, prostitutes, drug dealers and I think these cameras will help out a big deal in irradiating some of that problem. So, I thank you for moving on that.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Is there any other miscellaneous business?

MEMBER CASAR: Mr. President, I move we adjourn; seconded.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Moved and seconded that you adjourn. Roll call vote please.

NO REMARKS PERMITTED ON THE MOTION TO ADJOURN ROLL CALL: 10 YEAS, 0 NAYS

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: This meeting is adjourned.
