#### PUBLIC SPEAKS (OPEN FORUM--CITY BUSINESS ONLY)

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Public Speaks, Open Forum. The first speaker is Kathy Lopez.

MS. LOPEZ: Yes, my name is Kathy Lopez and I am a parent volunteer at Lehman Middle School.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: State your address please.

MS. LOPEZ: I live at 1209 Hoover Place NW in Canton. The reason why I'm here this evening is my concern about getting security on school campuses in the Canton School District. Being at Lehman as a citizen and as a parent, I've seen things on the other side of the fence. We had an incident that occurred on November the 9th regarding a fight that almost ensued. Had I not gotten to the campus early for other business matters, some children could have been injured. The students that had come to the campus were from McKinley and Timken High School, they were there to basically beat up an 8th grader. Myself and a teacher had to intervene. Nothing happened, thank God. We did call 9-1-1; we did call the Police Department 5 times after that. The response was 1 hour. I'm not saying that anyone's at fault, but I do have a concern as a citizen because, you know, from all the different letters and different things I had read within the paper and other meetings in general regarding the schools, our concern should be our children—not only mine, but everyone else. And the other concern is the faculty's safety. I know at this time there is no security on the campus due to budget cuts or money, but we do somehow or other, need to find a way to find money, put security police on campuses for the safety of these children, not only at Lehman but at all Canton City schools. You know, the times have changed; things are not what they used to be. And I know that many of you that sit here, who are here tonight, may or may not have children in the City schools, but either way, whether it's our children or someone else's, we need to be concerned—as a community and as people who sit on all these boards within Canton City.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Ma'am, have you addressed the School Board itself?

MS. LOPEZ: I have spoken with the principal, assistant principal, I have also sent a letter to the Mayor, I have sent a letter to the Police Chief. I have also sent a letter to Mr. Ken Kendal, who is the Supervisor of Security for the school campuses, and he has referred me to speak with Mr. Bernard Hunt, which I intend to do. And I also intend to address the School Board as well on this matter. (*Audience applause*)

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Okay.

SAFETY DIRECTOR HUNT: Mr. President, presently the City of Canton School Board contracts with the City of Canton for two officers at Timken and McKinley High Schools. I will contact Mr. Kendal to see if he has any other wishes...if he is interested in contracting for more officers or just what he needs.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Roger Zachary.

MR. ZACHARY: Good afternoon. My name is Roger Zachary, I reside at 2621 Wood Owl Street NE, Canton, Ohio. To the President of City Council, the Honorable Mayor and Members of Council, City Managers and associates. I'm here before you again today to ask you again to correct one of the problems that has existed since the beginning of Georgeview Estates allotment. The problem is sump pumps discharging water onto the street. We brought this problem to you on August 11, 2003, which at that time you asked us to compile a list of all the problems that we thought needed attention. By the way, this was just before the General Election. And again on October the 18th, 2004, we was instructed by the Canton City Building Department to discharge this water to the street. I personally talked to the City Service Director at that time and expressed that I thought behind the curb drain would be a better source. He told me that behind the curb drain would plug up and there would be no way

to clean it. From what I hear in Phase 2 and 3 behind the curb drains have now been okayed by the Building Department. It cost me an additional \$600 to run a pipe to the street, \$150 to have the curb cored for the pipe that would dump this water on the street. Today to correct the problem in my case, we would have to run a discharge behind the city block just to get to a storm drain, because the storm drain system was possibly improperly installed or maybe something was just overlooked. After this was done, it was discovered during the winter months that discharged water would freeze up at the street and the water backed up in garages of a lot of homes. When the ice becomes snow-covered, the snow plow driver plowed the middle of the street—in my opinion, the reason why this was done was because if the snow plow driver got next to the curb, he would possibly slip and run over some mailboxes. Due to the curb not being plowed, we sometimes got a week or more, we've went a week or more without mail delivery. What do we have to do to get this problem addressed? I have one more problem. Problem number two—gravel and crushed limestone has been okayed for a footer to build a home in the City of Canton. We couldn't get a City Building inspector to okay a cement footer because it had water in the trenches along the sides back in the year 2000. Today, we can put gravel and crushed limestone footers in and set manufactured walls on it in pouring rain and knee-deep water. Did the City of Canton Building Code change that drastically in 5 years? Do anyone know the life expectancy of these homes? I'd like to know what is the city government of Canton doing to support and help its citizens that are investing in the City of Canton to maintain and keep their investment?

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Mr. Zachary, your 3 minutes are up. Bring your remarks to a close.

MR. ZACHARY: I'm done. But I'd like some answers.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Okay. I'll say this, I went out there and I looked at the problem with you. This evening, I gave the cross-section view of the homes being constructed to the Mayor. She's going to look into it with Mr. Hunt. Now I was always taught that when pouring placed footers, you dig your trench 16 inches wide, 8 inches deep, put rebar in it, pour concrete in place, vibrate it, and then lay your block wall up or cement poured-in-place walls. But this type of construction is shoddy. They're going to look into it. I don't know how these people can get away with this type of construction. But the City is going to look into it. I'll see to that.

MR. ZACHARY: I'm worried about my investment; I've invested my life savings in the City of Canton.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Well, the City's going to look into this and your problem. Thank you sir.

MR. ZACHARY: Thank you.

SERVICE DIRECTOR CONCATTO: Mr. President, Mr. Zachary. I will talk to you after the meeting. I have met with our drainage committee about the sump pump issue—there's two alternatives that we have with that. I will discussed them with you after this meeting. And also, I'm not so sure that we would be avoiding that plowing issue; I would want to talk to our Street Department. I don't believe it's the ice, but I will talk to them and make sure the street's plowed correctly.

MR. ZACHARY: Yeah, well, we went more than a week without mail delivery. And you can ask anybody out there because the mailman would not deliver because he can't get to the boxes.

SERVICE DIRECTOR CONCATTO: Mr. President, I don't question what you're saying—I just question the fact that maybe we....let me talk to you about that too and I will talk to our Street Department for this year's plowing.

MR. ZACHARY: Okay, thank you.

MEMBER ZACHARY: Mr. President, I would ask the Mayor's Administration to please keep me abreast of any information that is found out. In the research that I've been doing with our Building Department, I've been told that these footers are quite legal, which I find appalling. I've been told that they're not doing anything that they shouldn't be doing within the scope of the Building Code. And that they can do it because they're building a large number of homes. I find that reprehensible. I think it's also to our advantage if we're doing our own home program for the City of Canton, and we've put guidelines in place for ourselves to follow, then we should be making other people do it too. And it's just totally deplorable that we are in a situation where a company is going to be able to come into an established development and totally demoralize it and lower the property values that have already been established. So I would like to be kept abreast of what's going on and making that they do what they're supposed to do by the book every step of the way. And right now, I can tell you right now that they're not. Because that man that just stood at that podium for about a year fought to get a City ordinance put on the books that under new home construction you have to have a dumpster and a port-a-john in front of each construction site and that's not happening.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: All right now, we have to remember that this is Public Speaks. But I want to get your ideas, so that those that are here and spoke can hear what you have to say. Who else is asking?.... Safety Director.

SAFETY DIRECTOR HUNT: Mr. President. I did go to Georgeview and spoke to both of these gentlemen that are sitting in the back last week. We walked around, we looked at the homes. I had the Building Inspector come out and not only review the buildings that they're talking about, but there were some other drainage issues that we looked at. We're also going to have someone from BIA take a look at the area and there's another question about plumbing, plastic pipe, we're going to take a look at that also.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Okay, the next speaker has a funny first name...Debbie Harding. Deborah.

MS. HARDING: Hello, Deborah Harding, 702 Clarendon Avenue NW. As you know, I've had lots of problems in my neighborhood. Last Friday on November 4th and Monday, November 7th, and Wednesday, November 9th, I came home from work to broken bottles in my driveway. On November 7<sup>th</sup>, I filed a police report by phone. And on November 9th, an officer came out and filed a report and saw the glass. My security camera caught it on tape on Wednesday and we saw two bottles being thrown on the tape, but we didn't, we could see they came from across the street-the officer came in the house and looked at the tape, saw that they looked they came from 2522 -7<sup>th</sup> Street NW where we've had all the problems. But you couldn't see anyone. So then my, the cop went over and talked to our one neighbor and he said that he heard the bottles break between 10 and 11 a.m. on the 9th. He failed to tell us that the one kid came back in to pick up one of the bottles, which we also caught on tape. So I called the Police Department yesterday and told them that we did have the guy on tape coming back in to pick up one of the bottles. He told me now I have to go to the Prosecutor's Office, that they couldn't come out even though we have who it is. I have sent several e-mails to Mr. Hunt and Mr. Hawk about my concerns in the neighborhood. They never e-mail me back, call me, I have no idea if they're even getting my e-mails, I'm sure they are. These neighbors have cost me \$300 in repairs to my air conditioner lines, over \$1800 in vet bills for my dogs when they poisoned it and my husband and I are thinking about calling Homeland Security because to me this is a form of terrorism and I'm not getting anywhere with the Police Department. Officer Nolte that did come out the other night was wonderful, he is the best officer I've ever seen that has come out for anything. He took the time to talk over to their house, knock on their door, unfortunately no one was home. He looked around the trash can, I mean he did go around and talk to people. I was very proud of him and he is a wonderful officer.

Also there was a detective or a Patrolman Marino that stopped by my house on Saturday. I was not home; he did leave a note that he wanted to talk to me regarding concerns of criminal activity in the neighborhood. I really hate to have to take the time off work to go back down to the Prosecutor's Office. I will do whatever it takes, but I want this kid talked to, I want him prosecuted. I want something done. I've got it right here. He did it. I want something done. That's it. Thank you. (*Audience applause*)

MEMBER HAWK: Mr. President, may I comment?

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Yes.

MEMBER HAWK: All of your e-mails are received and the reason you got some of the good response is because they all get forwarded to our Community Interaction Officer, Mark Fox. He indicated he would have people out there looking into the problem and process each and every time we receive one—each and every complaint is handled to the best of our ability and he's working on it. But trust me on that one, he does a fine job with us. And Mark always e-mails me back that he received it and tells me what he's going to do.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The next speaker is Dank Webb.

MR. WEBB: Council President, Mayor and Members of Council. I live at 2638 Wood Owl Street in the Georgeview Estates development. And my concern today is kind of dealing with the standards of building homes and the standards that the City has set and whether or not the builders that are building out there are meeting those standards. It's quite evident that there are many changes based on the homes that have been built already versus the homes that are going in. Why there are changes allowed and we have not been advised of it, I don't know. The fact that pre-poured walls are going in, I'm not saying it is bad, I'm not saying that it's good. But we don't know the effect that these particular walls will have on the homes that they are building there, the longevity of those walls, the longevity of the homes that's going to be there—the impact that it's going to have, whether their homes are going shift, what these houses are sitting on. They're sitting on very small pads that are about 12 by 12 at each corner. I personally cannot see where this is going to maintain some stability. It has been addressed already and I don't want to belabor the point, but just to kind of reinforce what has been said already in terms of the impact that it's having on our community. The one thing that concerns me is that the advertising signs that are out there right now indicate that they are willing to accept individuals in the homes that have not necessarily made sacrifices to get into the homes. It looks as if they're going to put the people in the homes at any cost. If that is an indication of their concern about the quality of the houses, then maybe they are going to build a house at any cost and be substandard as well. Build a house, leave, and in 5 or 10 years we have to deal with the issue of a devaluation in our homes. I would appreciate it if the City Council would be able to kinda let us know what those standards are, if they've changed, and if they've changed whether they've changed for the good. And if you've done any research on it, you'll find out that, yes, these walls have been built on this particular type of setting. People have never had any problems. We'd like to be reassured that that's the case. Thank you for your time. (Audience applause)

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: The final speaker is Brenda Baylor.

MS. BAYLOR: My name is Brenda Baylor, I live at 2722 Wood Owl. And I would like to say greetings to all of City Council. I, however, am here not because I am pleased. I am here because to be very honest with you, I am quite angry. I am very much concerned about the building codes and regulations. I moved where I live in Georgeview Estates, I took a leap of faith. And I want to start with the things as I see them as being bad. And then I see that nothing is being done, or that some of us because we were there first, are being overlooked. First

of all, the street. If you come down Marietta, I guarantee you that you either have to drive in the middle of the street or you will have an extremely bumpy ride all the way down. It is a relatively new street. Why it is that the Building Code or the City Code or whatever it is did not make sure that that street is put in correctly is beyond my comprehension. The next problem of course is the water. We have been fighting this water problem since we have been there. It is my understanding that the water problem is now going to be somewhat corrected in Phase 3, possibly Phase 2, which means those of us in Phase 1 I guess are supposed to lose out, or are we supposed to spend our money? The next problem is the tax abatement. We moved into the area, it is supposed to be a development. But when the City decided they wanted to change to a 10-year tax abatement, those of us who had been there, which were 20-some strong, lost out on the 10-year abatement. We were told sorry, you only got the 3. The next problem is the new builders who have signs up that are the most degrading thing that I have ever seen. I can't imagine any place in the City that I would want to live to see signs up that are that degrading. Not only that, but in my opinion, not anyone else's, I feel that they are predatory lenders. Because I can't imagine how in the world you can offer somebody the home of their dreams, okay...you could offer them the home of their dreams and they have no money. If that had been the case, I think I would have probably moved elsewhere. Okay, the next problem, of course, is our sump pumps. The sump pumps have been on-going. It is my understanding that the City doesn't even have a code that says that you have to have sump pumps. Consequently we have homes in our area that do not have sump pumps and it could very well be that the new builders are not planning on putting in sump pumps. Because at the look of what they've done so far, I am sure that they are going to cut corners any way that they possibly can. My third concern is the foundations. I have no problem with concrete foundations, in fact I think that's what they're doing in Alaska because they have been found to be extremely secure. But these were brought in on huge cranes, they were dropped into the ground. There are now 5 houses and I'm not real sure why there's only 5, because at the rate that they're putting them up, they probably could do more. I am thoroughly disgusted. I am a citizen of Canton, Ohio. I moved here as I said before on a leap of faith. Assuming that I was moving to a place where regulations were already in place. I am quite disgusted when someone says to me, well after all you did, know that you moved into a swamp-there are many areas everywhere where it is a swampy area. But the Codes and the Building Codes take care of that prior to anyone ever moving there. I am here because I am questioning this. I would like to know when it's going to be set in place. I would like to know when the 20-some of us who are already there are going to get the benefits of what...because we have fought for or 4 years or more is now set in place for everybody else all over the City. Are we to lose out because we happen to be the forerunners. I'm not sure. But at this point, I'm upset.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Ma'am, bring your remarks to a close.

MS. BAYLOR: I'm through. (Audience applause)

#### **MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS**

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: We're now under Miscellaneous Business. Is there any miscellaneous business?...

MEMBER ZACHARY: Mr. President, I'd like to ask the Law Director because it's been a couple months now, I had asked the Law Department to draft legislation banning predatory lending within the City of Canton and at the time I was told that we were waiting for ruling I believe it was from the Ohio Supreme Court in reference to the same issue. Has anything been concluded?

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Mr. President. Member Zachary, not yet. As you recall there's a conflict among different courts of appeals which are the sandwich layer between the trial courts and the Supreme Court

of Ohio. They've ruled different ways on whether or not cities enact their own predatory lending ordinances that are in conflict with or are different from the State law. As soon as that is issued, we'll have the guidance we need to decide whether or not we need our own or whether the Supreme Court said that the State law is the law of the land.

MEMBER ZACHARY: I would just be interested in knowing how customary is it to see a development that has homes that are valued between 200 and 250,000 dollars with vacant lots in between that are advertising newly constructed homes for people with poor credit, no money down, bad credit, okay. That to me is not customary. And I'm not denouncing anyone in a position that is under those circumstances per se. But to me it's a contradiction in terms to see that and then to see 26 signs in this development saying, hey, you can have this type of house even if your credit is totally shoddy. To me it's setting people up for failure and that's morally wrong. And we as a City need to get behind, pushing for something against these predatory lenders to make sure that they don't take advantage of people.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Is there any other Miscellaneous Business?

MEMBER WEST: Mr. President, some time ago we passed I believe it was a resolution where we had given the railroad, we had given them permission to close several crossings. We also had, I guess it was an exchange to update certain railroad crossings as well. Twelfth Street was one of them, and this winter, right now currently 12<sup>th</sup> Street is not repaired and I think several of those closings have not happened. Do we know where they're at with that in terms of repairing those crossroads and closing those?

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Service Director?....Safety Director...? Anybody know?

SAFETY DIRECTOR HUNT: Mr. President, I do not know where we are at this point in time. I will check with the City Engineer. I know there was I believe 12 that they did and I know there was a time frame on those. I don't know where they are, but I'll find out.

MEMBER WEST: Yeah, I'd appreciate that because this winter, of course, we want to make sure...yeah, it's 12<sup>th</sup> & Lawrence. And then also, we had gotten some, a letter back in reference to the cameras being placed somewhere by AEP. Where are we at with the security cameras for neighborhoods?

SAFETY DIRECTOR HUNT: At long last, I put in a purchase order to purchase the cameras last week. Hopefully within a week or two, those cameras will be in. I've done all the ground work with AEP and SBC for the connections. So the cameras are on order.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Any other Miscellaneous Business?

MEMBER CARBENIA: Mr. President, yes, and I'll be looking forward to those cameras since I was first up. But what I have to say is, it's not funny, I'm not too happy with *The Repository* with what they done right after election. The front page showing a couple of our Councilpeople in a trash can. I can't believe that we have a rag like that in this town. That is so degrading to people who have given good service to this City. Mary Babcock has been a long time Councilperson and has done a good job here and that is degrading to her. Rosemary Diamond has also been a long time Councilperson. She is going to be replaced, but let's have a little bit of dignity and let them go out with dignity, not showing them in a trash can. Because that's exactly what it looked like, that they were degrading them. And even though Butch Kraus is a good friend of mine and I'm happy that he's coming on Council and he's a democrat, I still don't like what they did to our peers at this, here in our City of Canton.

And that's why I hate even advertising in that paper. (Applause)

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Member Carbenia, those of us in public service that are elected by the people can bear that embarrassment, but it's our families who suffer the most when they do that. And I agree with you, that rag should not be allowed to print that kind of tripe. But of course there's that First Amendment that guarantees them the right to degrade people. I can't believe that goes on in this country. What an excuse to degrade people, the First Amendment. Is there any other Miscellaneous Business?

MEMBER DOUGHERTY: Tomorrow and...thank you, Mr. Carbenia, for those comments. Tomorrow at 12 noon, downtown will be dedicating the City Clock for our birthday. Tomorrow's our birthday, folks, let's not forget it, 200 years. So, there will be a dedication at 12 noon. I'm sure the Mayor will be there, hopefully, and they'll be dedicating that at 12 noon, Market Avenue in front of the Millennium Building, between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Street there. So I want to be sure everybody knows about that. Also Mr. Hawk, the Finance meeting specifically will be talking hopefully about the money we need for demolition of homes? In your one meeting you have, is that going to be on the agenda.

MEMBER HAWK: Mr. President, yes, at that point in time, Gary Young from the Auditor's Office will be bringing us down several options to appropriate the dollars to continue the demolition of homes.

MAYOR CREIGHTON: Mr. President, just a couple things, first of all, thank you for the reminder about the clock tomorrow. Also a reminder to everyone in our City that Thursday we will light the park decorations in our beautiful Canton City Parks. All the displays made by our own employees. That is free and open to the public and we encourage families to come out. On the other note, I concur with Councilmember Carbenia. I have made my voice heard by writing a Letter To The Editor. So we will see if it is published. My only question to *The Repository* is you wonder why people don't run for office? I think that answers my question. I mean, you know, it is unfair and I'm not going to go into a tirade about it, but I was sickened by what I saw.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Very tragic. Is there any other Miscellaneous Business?

SERVICE DIRECTOR CONCATTO: Mr. President, just for Council's information, the BIA Urban Housing Foundation has received their 501(C)(3). We got notified of that this morning. The next phase of that will be to come together to sign the project agreement, which we've looked at. That we'll do very soon. The time lines for that I think are still effective August of 2006, I believe, or September, for half of the houses. So that project is finally moving forward. (*Audience applause*)

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Any other Miscellaneous Business?

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Mr. President, we do live in a flawed society; we have our dysfunctions. We show disrespect to one another sometimes and not love. But I want to take this opportunity to say to President Denczak, who is a veteran of the armed services, those of you who are veterans of the armed services, in the audience and City—thank you. Because you all put your lives on hold for a while, or put your lives on the line, we have freedom to disagree. We have the freedom to defend the First Amendment and to criticize those who we believe show a lack of love and a lack of respect for dignity. Again, I want to say thank you on behalf of all of us who live a better life because of all of you. (*Applause*)

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Well in World War II, if I'd of known we was going to have a newspaper like The Repository, I think I would have surrendered to the comrades and given up.

MEMBER CARBENIA: Mr. President, just to add to that, Mr. President, are you going to be there to wind the clock, since you were there to wind the first one? (*Laughter*)

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: That's a cheap shot. Yes, I will be there if there's free food. Is there any other...

MEMBER DOUGHERTY: Mr. President, Service Director I need you to stay after too, I have a constituent that needs to talk to you, okay? (*Inaudible response*)

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Is there any other Miscellaneous Business?....before somebody shoots at me again.

MEMBER CASAR: Mr. President, I move we adjourn; seconded.

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: Moved and seconded that you adjourn; roll call vote please.

NO REMARKS PERMITTED ON THE MOTION TO ADJOURN ROLL CALL: 12 YEAS, 0 NAYS

PRESIDENT DENCZAK: This meeting is adjourned.
