

MINUTES OF THE MEETING MAY 16, 2016

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Good evening ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to Canton City Council. For those of you who may not know, I'm wearing a hat because my doctor asked me to. I had some head surgery and he said you have to wear hats, so that's what I'm doing. I'm not trying to be disrespectful, but I do think I look very dapper! (*Laughter*). So, if we could get the Repository to do a...you know...a story I might have, it would be very appreciative. And with a quorum present, the Chair calls this meeting of Canton City Council to order. Roll call vote please, Mister Clerk.

TWELVE COUNCIL MEMBERS PRESENT.

CLERK SHOWES: Twelve yeas, Sir.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you. Tonight's invocation was assigned to Member Hawk and Member Hawk will introduce the person that will give our invocation. If you'll all stand and remain standing please, for our Pledge of Allegiance.

The regular meeting of Canton City Council was held on May 16, 2016 at 7:30 P.M. in the Canton City Council Chamber. The roll call was taken (see above) by Clerk of Council, Kellen Showes. The invocation was given by Chaplain Forest Thorn, of the Military Order of the Purple Heart #699. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by President Schulman.

AGENDA CORRECTIONS & CHANGES

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you very much for that invocation. We certainly appreciate...and we appreciate you having come down, all of you. We obviously are very appreciative of your military service to our country. Thank you. We're now under Agenda Corrections and Changes. Leader.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Turning now to Public Hearings. We have none this evening.

OLD BUSINESS

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: We're now under Old Business. We have no Old Business this evening.

PUBLIC SPEAKS

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: We now turn to Public Speaks. We have 3 speakers signed up this evening. And our first speaker is James Parker.

JAMES PARKER: James Parker, thank you, Council President Schulman. 630 Penny Street SE, North Canton.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you.

JAMES PARKER: What is the power of a football game, you say? After the 1967 battle...September...of Grambling's James Harris vs. Florida A&M's Ken Riley, the Black College Championships. The perception of Blacks as playing quarterbacks shifted dramatically. You know, it was Vick that broke Marion Motley's single yards per carry record in a game, 18. some yards in 2002. It stood for almost 60 years. So this game compelled Southern colleges to integrate as well. The story will be forever preserved here now that the deal, the historic agreement that the Black College Football Hall of Fame will have a permanent home at Canton's Pro Football Hall of Fame. What does this signify to the City of Canton? What signs or signals can our City Council send back that proves unequivocally that Canton stands beside, not behind, the Pro Football Hall of Fame in all these endeavors? Perhaps...I've seemed to have lost a note or two, I apologize...

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: That's fine.

JAMES PARKER: We could send that, in celebrating excellence everywhere and honoring the heroes of our past. If it would please Council President Schulman, could we table a resolution to name a place of distinction, within...say...the Kresge Lot, or nearby, in honor of Marion Motley? Canton's own Jackie Robinson of Pro Football, one of the four that integrated the color barrier in Pro Football and he gets a street on Carnahan? That's laughable. A proper distinction for Alan Page, such as an area besides the wrong side of town? Like a prominent, diversely visited place without a slum playground. Say...a jury room in the City Hall, here. Oh, that was turned down several times, sorry. Also, could City Council President Schulman please call Dave Baker for me, to see if they would pursue the American Indian Athletic Hall of Fame to have a permanent home within the Pro Football Hall of Fame as well. Then you have an induction for the Black athletes, you have an induction for the American Athletes, you have our other induction...you're pulling out and taking taffy and warming it and pulling it to extend and soften the reception here for such ideas. The American Indian Athletic Hall of Fame President, Carol Green, is quoted in Indian Country Today as wanting to have a building of their own. They currently occupy space within the Lawrence Building in Kansas City, Missouri, an extension of the Haskell Indian School. I hope our Pennsylvanian...that knows about the Carlisle Indian School, would support these issues. Our connection as home to American Indian athletes like Jim Thorpe, Bill Gardner, Gus Welch, Joe Guyon, Pete Calac, Joseph Little Twig, Don Peters, Bill Garlowe, etc; instantly qualifies Canton for consideration as they were all champions of the Canton Bulldogs. Only Altoona matched us. Thank you.

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PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you very much. Thanks. (*Applause*). Our next speaker is Pete DiGiacomo. Mr. DiGiacomo, as always, welcome to Canton. If you'll step forward and give us your name and your residential address, please.

PETE DIGIACOMO: Yes, my name is Pete DiGiacomo. I live at 600 Dent Place SW, Canton, Ohio. Had no intention on speaking tonight until I sat in the back there and listed to...about the debate about the water lines. The one thing that was brought up more than once is that the sewer lines in the city of Canton are very, very old. I agree. And if they blacktop over top of these sewer lines, then they got to tear up the new asphalt that's put down. Well, apparently the solution is, until all the sewer lines are fixed, the city shouldn't blacktop any streets. Does that make common sense? Because that's what you're saying. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you very much, as always. (*Applause*). Our last speaker tonight is Juanita Best. Ms. Best. Take your time, I understand you have a broken foot so it's probably not easy getting up here.

JUANITA BEST: Well, a broken foot probably would have healed a lot quicker. (*Laughter*).

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: And at least our Clerk hasn't started the timer yet. (*Laughter*). Make you rush up.

JUANITA BEST: Okay, thank you for your time...

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Don't forget your name though, and your residential address, and welcome.

JUANITA BEST: Okay. Thank you very much. My name is Juanita Best and I resident at 1603 Esther Avenue NE, here in Canton. That's been my address for 3 years. I purchased a home there in August of 2013. Subsequently, I have a retaining wall encroachment issue along the backside of my home from the neighboring property. I've been addressing this for 2 years. Between Rick and Gary at the Zoning Board and the Code Enforcement, as well as the...Mr. West, Thomas West, our fine Councilman, has been out to see it as well. And Ernie Sellers has been out this week. It's a really...it's a tramatic issue. It's very dangerous. I've sought legal council. They've told me to rope it off, don't use it...you know...it's not safe. It's a wall, it's a yard that's coming in on my fence, that's on my side. We want to take the fence down and replace it. We want to put up a really nice fence. This is an old, you know, the wrought iron fence. It's all rusty. It runs all the way...it runs the whole block along the back of my home. Subsequently, we can't do that because if we do that, the neighboring yard will totally cave in on my home...on my property. There's a block wall that's holding it up that's caving in on my fence. That's moved 6" since last year. Last year they decided they were going to turn it over to Jennifer Fitzsimmons. The home where this is happening, that's coming onto my property, was a rental. The gentleman that owned it wasn't willing to do anything with it. They asked me to spend the money, \$500.00, and get a pin survey, which I did. It proved that it is his responsibility and at that time they agreed on that. He was not willing to do so...to do anything. They ordered him to fix it. So, they decided they would fine him. Well, it's cheaper, obviously, for him to pay the fine than to take care of this issue. They estimated it to be between \$18,000.00 and \$25,000.00 to fix this wall. So therefore, Jennifer Fitzsimmons got involved and she said, "Well, we'll put a lien again it, it won't really help you, but he won't be able to sell it." "If he goes to sell it, he'll have to fix it first". Well, that never happened. He sold it here with a group of 7 other homes for \$140,000.00, a couple months back. It's in the paper, to an (*Inaudible*) Properties Group, who is some kind of Indian Website, when we pulled it up. So, our hands our tied. I've left like 8 messages now with Jennifer in the last month, to no avail. I've never had no returns. Ernie Sellers has

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contacted her as well. You know, I don't know what more...you know...we can do with it. My insurance company has sent me a letter. They were out. They wanted us to take some trees down, which we did. They said, when they saw the issue, they said we're not going to continue to insure your home any further; for fire and things, we will, but if this happens...if this would cave in and cause problems, we won't cover that. So, I mean, we've spent \$10,000.00 in upgrades in this home and we're continuing to and we'd like to know what maybe could be done to help us with this.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Well...you might...if you would stay around until after the meeting is over, a number of people here will...

JUANITA BEST: Wonderful. Wonderful. Thank you so much.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Law Director Martuccio would be happy to discuss this with you.

JUANITA BEST: Thank you so much for your time.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Well, you're very welcome. I hope you're feeling better. *(Applause)*.

JUANITA BEST: Thank you very much.

MEMBER WEST: President Schulman.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Yes, Member West.

MEMBER WEST: Also, the Engineer's Office has been out there as well. A lot of departments have been out there and they've been working as well with Ms. Best. This family needs to be commended because they've been dealing with this terrible situation for many years.

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PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: It's been moved and seconded to suspend the Statutory Rule for Ordinance #10. Any remarks? Hearing none, Mister Clerk, roll call vote please.

NO REMARKS

ROLL CALL 12 YEAS, 0 NAYS

CLERK SHOWES: Twelve yeas Sir.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you. Motion carries. You've heard the 3 readings, Leader.

MEMBER MORRIS: Mr. President, I move we adopt Ordinance #10.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: It's been moved and seconded that you adopt Ordinance #10. Any remarks?

MEMBER MORRIS: Yes, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Leader.

MEMBER MORRIS: I just would like to go on the record as saying, once again, that I definitely oppose an increase. I don't think that they have shown justified proof that they need it and as...you know, I'm sitting up here and I'm thinking, one of the things that kept being brought up is...you know, we have sewers that date back all the way to the 1800's. Our water lines date all the way back to the 1800's. But what's ironic is, the majority of our sewer problems and the majority of our water line repairs are on the Northern end of the city. All post World War II materials. Okay...so, I think using the comment that, you know, all of our water lines in the city of Canton date back to the 1800's... we've actually heard in presentations from our Water Department, that the wall thickness of those water lines and those sewer lines are inches thick, not like the small ones which is creating the problems in Member Mack's Ward. I think it's not...I just cannot support this. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you Leader. Any other remarks? Yes, Chairman.

MEMBER HARMON: There were a lot of good comments made during the Committee Meeting and when the original presentation was made on April 4th. But one that stands out in my mind and I (*Inaudible*). But I did some (*Inaudible*) looking at the comparisons to other communities. I don't know if (*Inaudible*) is close in size, but our base grade is \$30.57; theirs is \$84.50. I don't know if Akron's apples and oranges, but theirs is \$90.00, \$60.00 more than ours. Maybe it would be best if apples to apples comparison (*Inaudible*). I just wanted to point that out. (*Inaudible*). I still think if what we know to be true, ours is still a pretty good bargain.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you Chairman Harmon. Any other remarks?

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Yes.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Law Director Martuccio.

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of Council. It was asked in the Committee Meeting, because of the nature of the way this Ordinance was written, I believe by Member Fisher,

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to explain how to vote to go each particular way such to avoid any confusion. I'll start out just as clearly as I can. If you are in favor or the 3% rate increase for the sewer, if you're in favor you vote no. Reason being, the increase goes into affect automatically unless Council takes a step to shut it down, stop it, waive it. So the Ordinance is written in such a way as to waive it. So, if you want to stop the increase from going into affect, vote yes, I want to stop the increase. Let me say it again in plain English. If you're in favor of the 3% increase, vote no. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you, Law Director. Any other remarks? I would just suggest that to follow up on the Chair, that this is an important issue and unfortunately we live in a time where, if you withhold the funding now, the prospect of paying enormous amounts later is pretty certain to occur, unfortunately. Now the problem is that cities are strapped all over the State for the reasons we've mentioned over and over and over again. But, nevertheless, that is the fact, so you should take that under consideration.

MEMBER DOUGHERTY: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Yes.

MEMBER DOUGHERTY: That is in effect just what we did with the 9%. That's why we had to do that.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Yes, Member Dougherty. Any other remarks?

MEMBER WEST: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: YES.

MEMBER WEST? I'd just like to applaud the sponsors because, again, this is a good debate and I think there was merits on both sides, and I just appreciate both people for bringing this up. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: It's been moved and seconded that you adopt Ordinance 11 as amended. Any remarks now? Member West.

MEMBER WEST: Mr. President. I'm going to abstain for the appearance of a conflict of interest.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you, Member West. Any other remarks?

MEMBER FISHER: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Yes, Member Fisher.

MEMBER FISHER: I want (*Inaudible*) the sponsor or the Chairman would mind going over the changes in the amendment with everybody.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Chairman Mack.

MEMBER MACK: I will briefly yield to the sponsor and Law Director, and of course, (*Inaudible*) to provide any other...

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Member Scaglione.

MEMBER SCAGLIONE: I'll go ahead and let Joe cover the changes there.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Law Director.

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Thank you. Mr. President. Members of Council, Sponsor Scaglione, and Chairman. The original ordinance that came down was designed to do something that is a wonderful goal. Member Scaglione's residents expressed great dissatisfaction, understandably, at looking at an anchor store and a mall that was once great and now is in decay. They shouldn't have to look at that or suffer property loss and de-values. I think, with a lot of work by this sponsor, Mr. Scaglione, your Chairman of the Judiciary Committee, Mack, and extensive amount of review and work by your Mayor and by your Chief Building Official, Mr. Williams, Mr. Bartos, among other, it is a new ordinance. The intent is still there. If you register properties that are non-residential, that are commercial, industrial, and vacant and in disrepair, this is a right size ordinance. I must say the first one we drafted was probably a sledgehammer for a fly. This is a more right size ordinance that specifically is tailored to going after those residential...non-residential properties or commercial properties that are in decay. The definitions are better. The remedies are better. Those responsible people that keep their vacant commercial buildings up will not be affected. It's designed to go after those who are not responsible and whose vacant properties pose a threat to the neighbors in terms of health, safety, welfare, or property value decay. I believe that's a summary, but again, I would be happy to let anyone else add any other (*Inaudible*). And again, I really have to say thank you to the Chairperson and the Mayor, particularly for an exorbitant amount of time they spent with the sponsor trying to make this brand new, complex ordinance the best it could be to the situation it's addressing.

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PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you, Law Director. Chairman Mack.

MEMBER MACK: Thank you, Mr. President. Unless there are any specific questions, I don't know if everyone's had an opportunity to review this, I just would like to reiterate the comment that I made in my email earlier today to thank the Law Director for all the work that he put into this; to thank the Mayor for the work that he put into this, and I'm talking hours of meetings, many, many drafts going back and forth; and to thank the Sponsor for taking charge and grabbing hold of this very forward thinking piece of legislation. Very proud to have played a role. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you. Any other remarks?

MEMBER FISHER: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Yes.

MEMBER FISHER: Just one specific question. In Committee, in one of the many Committee Meetings we had over this, Member West asked a question. We have a property owner, which is a small (*Inaudible*) property which has largely remained vacant over the years because we denied his zone change application or refused to move forward on them. Properties fall (*Inaudible*) some relatively good conditions for property.... to be clear, the way this is written out, property such as that would not be affected by the larger (*Inaudible*). Am I correct?

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Chairman Mack.

MEMBER MACK: Yes, thank you. Assuming...that this...we have, and let me start by saying first to reiterate Law Director Martuccio's point, we significantly narrowed the scope of properties that are going to be subject to this ordinance. Assuming that your property that you're talking about has no other code violations, has some utility connections, they won't have to (*Inaudible*).

MEMBER WEST: Has any...

MEMBER MACK: Has some utility connections, yes.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Member West.

MEMBER MACK: Sorry, that was my fault.

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Mr. President.

Something we should have had going on a long time ago, and it's a wonderful thing that we have that open to us, in which we can see it and review it. Thank you to the Administration.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Service Director.

SERVICE DIRECTOR BARTOS: Mr. President. Just real quick, I forgot for a couple weeks to bring this up, but I wanted to recognize two of our employees in the Street Department. Shortly after the Hall of Fame Marathon, we were picking up barricades from the parade route where they noticed a house fire in the 1100 block of 7th St. NW. These employees are Kirt Fatch and Joel Souliere. The Street Department employees, it's not their responsibility to go running up to a house that's burning but they actually did. They helped break a window and helped the resident escape before the firefighters arrived to put out the blaze. Actually, Councilman Hawk brought this up to me, so I thank him for making me aware of this and I conferred the situation to the Street Department. So, I wanted to thank both Kirt and Joel for their dedication to not only their job, but also to helping out a Cantonian in need. (*Applause*).

MEMBER HAWK: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Yes.

MEMBER HAWK: Here again. Thank you very much, and I'm going to work with the Law Director and we're going to write a Resolution commending both of those gentleman, along with 2 officers from our Police Department, and a very important member, a gentleman named Anthony Harris, from Ironworkers Local 550 who provided the crowbar that helped break that window out. So all of these people happened to arrive on the scene and the woman was not even aware that the fire was going through her house. They actually rescued her and helped her out. Our Fire Department was responsive and everybody did a wonderful job and nobody got injured. So, we'll be doing that in the near future. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you, Member Hawk. Any other Miscellaneous Business?

MEMBER MORRIS: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Leader.

MEMBER MORRIS: I have a question for the Administration and the Law Director. Conversations that myself and Asst. Leader Smith have had...now that we have the legislation in place on the vacant commercial properties, how soon can we anticipate enforcement? Especially along the East Tusc area where a very, very well known and predominant investor and developer in Canton has left some property sit vacant for far too long in Member Smith's Ward.

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Law Director.

LAW DIRECTOR MARTUCCIO: Thank you. Majority Leader. Minority...Asst. Majority Leader. I...first of

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all, have to point out that the Ordinance does not go into affect until 30 days from now when the Mayor signs it. Ordinarily, as you all know, when we make changes to our Codified Ordinances, which are the permanent Ordinances in the big green book, they are of such a permanent nature that we want to give our residents the right to referendum. So, first of all, it'll be 30 days before it goes into effect. Now, to your questions, which I know you care deeply about and that is those standards then will be able to be enforced by inspection, by citation. The first couple of citations are fines. It's a civil, not a criminal matter. It's a civil matter where it's strict liability. There's an appeal process (*Inaudible*). Now, upon subsequent offenses, it does escalate to a crime. And if the evidence is sufficient, it will be prosecuted. While I'm on this topic, I wanted to let you all know that one of our Civil Asst. Prosecutors has volunteered to help the Criminal Division with tall grass. We are down 2 full-time Prosecutors, the remaining Prosecutors are all furloughing, and Craig Chessler, who used to be a Prosecutor and used to be our Civil Code Enforcement Officer has volunteered to help them out, to be directly responsible to the Street Department, to work with them on mowing and tall grass issues that are appropriate for criminal prosecution. I understand that Rick Hoffman will be assigned also to work on gathering those particular (*Inaudible*) up for citation. You'll hear more about that in an email. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Thank you.

MEMBER MACK: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SCHULMAN: Yes.

MEMBER MACK: If I could just add on to the very precise comments of our Law Director...Chief Building Official Molnar is obviously very (*Inaudible*) in this position. He's going to be moving very quickly to begin this process once it starts. So if I could (*Inaudible*) to Leader Morris and Leader Smith, and everyone, look at the definitions of vacant and make sure your property would qualify and it's pretty easy to do, and then email Chief Building Official Molnar with that address of the property because he will be sending letters to these properties, notifying them of their obligation to register and once the registration happens, then an exterior inspection is automatic. So one thing that every member can do to help us begin the implementation of this is to get the vacant commercial properties emailed over to Chief Building Inspector Molnar.
